

Have You Read

The Importance of Reading

What a busy few months I've had-first off there was a thrilling and frightening journey across the arctic ice on a Victorian whaling ship- then a fascinating encounter with a 900 year old man who told me about his own life story that included being part of William Shakespeare's drama companyand finally learning more about the Black Lives Matter Campaign from a young woman called Starr who witnessed the fatal shooting of her best friend Khalil at the hands of a police officer.

How did I manage all of this whilst teaching at Saint Matthias? The answer: reading.

What I'm trying to stress is that reading allows us to enter a world of wonder and imagination. Of course I haven't been to all the places that I mentioned above-however I know all the details of these places because through reading I can experience them from the descriptions and scenes that are created. Reading develops and feeds our imagination. Not only that, reading gives you a drive. The drive to know what happens next, to want to turn the page, the need to keep going, even if it's hard, because someone's in trouble and you have to know how it's all going to end...that's a very real drive.

So, what else can reading do? Well, we know from research that children who read more widely and more often do better at school and in exams. The image at the bottom of the page really emphasises this point. Kids who read well, read well across the curriculum and are in a more advantageous position to succeed in school and life outside of school. That's what reading can do.


At St Matthias every student in year 7-9 has a reading book and read for 10 minutes at the start of every English lesson-students are reading in form time and our reading room too. The reading room is a place where students can read in a relaxed environment and is open in the morning before the start of school, break times, lunch times and after school too. To help develop a reading culture, rewards and incentives are given for reading. For example we have visited Harry Potter World, Old Trafford, taken students bowling and eaten at McDonalds. In the summer we visited Cadbury World, West Midlands Safari Park and Black Country Museum. As well as these visits, every term we hold a reward party for the students who are reading regularly.

There has been a significant rise in the number of students who are not only enthusiastic about reading but also making progress with their reading too.

However, a big challenge is to get all students to read more at home. Students take their reading book home and are expected to read at home for between 10-20 minutes each day (although if they want to read more they can). We need you support to develop regular reading habits at home by encouraging students to read and by talking to them about what they are reading. You can also match their interestshelp them find the right book for a subject or topic they are interested in. It doesn't matter if it's fiction, poetry, comic books, graphic novels, leaflets or non-fiction- as long as they are reading. It's important to remember that all reading is good. Reading can change lives. This is the importance of reading.



HALLOWEEN



The time to get those fancy dress costumes on and stock up on sweets and chocolate is fast approaching. But do you know how Halloween got its name and why we celebrate it? Halloween falls every year on October 31, which is a Wednesday this year. Modern day celebrations generally involve groups of children dressed in scary costumes roaming from house to house, demanding "trick-or-treat". Fearing the worst, intimidated householders normally hand over large amounts of treats in the form of chocolates and sweets to avoid whatever 'tricks' may have been dreamt up by these 'trick or treaters'! The origins of these celebrations however date back thousands of years, to pagan times in Ireland and the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain.

Samhain was a celebration of the end of the harvest season, and means "summer's end." People at this time thought the walls between worlds were thin and spirits could pass through into our world, and many feared that the spirits would damage crops for the next season. Many people would light bonfires and wear costumes to scare off the ghosts. Ok, so bonfires and costumes, both part of the traditions around Halloween- but where did the name Halloween come from? Again, this originated from many, many years ago.

In the eighth century, Pope Gregory the third declared that November the first would be a time to honour all saints which is why the first of November is known as All Saints Day. In fact, many of the traditions of the Samhain festival were celebrated on All Saints Day too. But why Halloween? Well, the evening before All Saints Day was known as All Hallows Eve, and later Hallowe'en. The word Halloween comes from Hallowe'en, meaning "hallowed evening" or holy evening.

Over time, Halloween evolved into a day of activities that we are all familiar with- like trick-or-treating, carving jack-olanterns, festive gatherings, wearing fancy dress costumes and eating lots of sweets!

Throughout Britain, Halloween has traditionally been celebrated by children's games such as bobbing for apples in containers full of water, telling ghost stories and the carving of faces into hollowed-out vegetables such as swedes and turnips. These faces would usually be illuminated from within by a candle, the lanterns displayed on window sills to ward off any evil spirits. However, the current use of pumpkins is a relatively modern custom imported from the United States, and we can also extend our thanks to our friends in America for that other potentially annoying feature of Halloween- the "trick-or-treat" tradition!

America makes a big deal out of Halloween – it is one of the most popular times of the year- second only to Christmas. The amount of money that Americans spend on Halloween supports this with a frightening (see what I did there?) 9.1 billion dollars spent on costumes and sweet treats!

So, how will you be celebrating Halloween? Will it be bobbing for apples, carving pumpkins, trick or treating or dressing up in fancy dress at a party? Whatever you're doing have fun, but be sensible. Have a spooktacular time!

To help launch this month three students in year I I made a video for pupils to watch depicting some of the key events that have happened throughout History. The video featured people such as Rosa Parks, Serena Williams and Nelson Mandela. The students showed their video during year group assemblies setting an excellent example to our younger students.



TOWERS

The Towers Outdoor Education Centre in Snowdonia has hosted and inspired our younger Year 7 students over many years with its outdoor and team building activities.

However, a new collaborative initiative between Saint Matthias and Towers saw sixty of our Year II Geography students visit the centre in the first week of October to study river and coastal features as part of their GCSE course. The trip provided an invaluable link between classroom theory and real world experience of river and coastal features, as well as the processes that shape them.

After being appropriately suited and booted for the weather conditions, our intrepid students spent the first day measuring features of the local streams and rivers to see first-hand the differences between the upper and middle courses of a river. Linking this to processes and classroom theory was a particularly successful outcome of the trip.

On the second day, after the previous night's forest walk, a good night's sleep and a hearty breakfast, we headed through mountain valleys (with river tributaries and waterfalls on view) to the North Wales coast to study coastal features of erosion and deposition, as well as coastal defences. We also visited the Conwy river estuary, completing the key components of river features from source to mouth. This proved to be invaluable preparation for their forthcoming GCSE exams in the summer.

The weather wasn't particularly kind but our valiant students conducted themselves admirably throughout (even surviving a night without the internet). They were a credit to our school and I'm proud of each and every one of them.


MATHS PUZZLE

HEALTHY EATING

PROMOTING HEALTHY LIFESTYLES

All students are encouraged to eat a healthy balanced diet. Students are therefore not allowed to bring in items such as: large bars of chocolate, family sized packets of crisps, packets of biscuits or any sugar / energy drinks. Chewing gum is not allowed in school.



Drinking in lessons

Clear, unflavoured mineral water can be drunk in lessons. This must be in a clear bottle. This is healthy and stops any learning time being wasted discussing what type of drink it is.



All students are encouraged to eat a healthy balanced diet. Students are therefore not allowed to bring in any sugary/ energy drinks, family sized packets of crisps, sweets or large bars of chocolate. Small snack sized items are allowed as an accompaniment to a lunch. Random 'Snack Attacks' will be introduced to check that none of these items have been brought to school. If any are found they will be confiscated and families will be notified.

Change



Students are increasingly asking for change. This can be very time consuming to facilitate and we frequently run out as all cash is banked daily. We have concluded that some parents are giving their children notes assuming that they bring them into school to put onto their accounts. A lot of these students aren't doing this – they appear to want to keep the cash, spend it at the shop and put the minimum amount of money on their account. After the half term holiday we will no longer be giving students change.
